2. Using "real life" ASL Another way to experience ASL is by using "real life" situations. For example, when you are in an ASL lesson or in a language exchange workshop, you can use it in order to practice your skills in real-life situations. 3. Using online resources for signers of different languages There are both free and paid online resources for learning ASL. Some include the BSL Forum, the Deafliopedia, American Sign Language Dictionary/Concepts, LingoDeer, and so on. Many of these free resources are also often linked to on ASL YouTube channels.
